FORMER PRESIDENT ALAN DOMVILLE CONTINUES HIS REMINISCENCES AS A MOTORING WRITER & LIFELONG GROUP FRIEND.....

Almost every time I attend a new car launch these days so many of my senior journalist colleagues declare words to the effect that "We've had the best days and they won't be coming back." They are referring especially to lavish trips to all points of the globe which took up to a week to undertake - about which I have reminisced in my series of contributions to our newsletter over the years.

Another well-used comment is "Who are these people?" This is a reference to the presence of non-journalists who have created websites, allegedly in order to obtain test cars.

And there's another. "Who could possibly consider inviting him or her - they cannot even drive!" In this instance the "Glass Half Empties" are complaining about the "influencers" who push products with the prestigious backcloth of, say, an Audi or a Mercedes-Benz.

To the first comment I would say the "days" are as enjoyable as they ever were; foreign trips are as plentiful as ever for those who supply cuttings after events. DRIVING THROUGH AUTUMN: TIPS FROM IAM ROADSMART

It's now officially autumn so we're going to take a look at some of the hazards you may come across. Follow these tips by IAM RoadSmart's head of driving and riding standards, Richard Gladman, to make sure you stay safe whilst driving throughout autumn.

- Check your battery before the winter arrives. In winter we often place a strain on the battery with lights, heated screens, seats and the air conditioner to demist and keep us warm. If there are any sign of your car battery struggling now, it's likely to let you down as it gets colder
- Prepare for darker mornings and evenings. You'll be doing a lot more driving in the dark when autumn hits, so ensure you're confident whilst driving in the dark
- That low winter sun can be an issue so keep a pair of sunglasses in the car and also make use of the sun visor too. If you are dazzled, slow down immediately
- Now is the time to check your antifreeze levels. The good thing about antifreeze is that
 it contains additives that prevent corrosion and rust, and during the summer it helps
 keep the engine from overheating
- Top up the windscreen washer with de-icing additive the colder it gets the stronger the solution needs to be
- Check your windscreen wipers. If they begin to blur the front/rear window or begin making an awful squeaking noise, it's time to replace them with new ones
- Have a look at your car headlights. It is dangerous for you and for the other road users if your lights do not work properly. Changing a bulb is often a complicated job these days so do it at home and not at the roadside
- Leaves or pine needles on the road can turn into a mushy film which obscures potholes, road markings and increases stopping distance. Anticipate problems when you approach woods and trees and slow down until the road is clear
- Watch out for animals. October through to December is considered the highest risk of deer collisions in the UK, so take notice of any wildlife signs that you come across and take extra care

There may be more distractions over the next few months with events taking place, such as Guy Fawkes night. There may be fireworks going off so ensure you're alert for any scared animals that may run into the road. Also, Halloween is approaching, so you'll have some ghouls and ghosts walking the streets so be sure to look out for them.

Richard said: "As the temperature drops, your car is a nice cosy place to be when it is working properly - sound preparation will help your journey go smoothly. Frosty mornings and falling leaves might be picturesque but they can cause all sorts of problems, particularly for two-wheeled road users. Give motorcyclists and cyclists more room and anticipate their actions."

"Drivers also need to stay alert for blocked drains and localised flooding at this time of year. Your aim should always be to have a clear view of the changing seasons around you, and for other road users to be able to see you."

INTERESTING CAR FACTS (WELL I THOUGHT SO!) [Ack: thefactfile.org]

The world's first automobile was developed by Carl Benz in 1885. The top speed of the
motor car was 16 km per hour. It had a one cylinder four-stroke engine installed
horizontally on a specifically designed chassis. It was known as the Benz Patent
Motorwagen.



- In 1908, the Model T developed by Henry Ford became the first car available to the masses. This was a low-cost car. It cost around \$850 in 1908 and \$260 in 1925 (the reduction in the cost of the car was because of the invention of the assembly line).
- The first self-propelled vehicle-Cugnot Fardier—was made by Nicolas-Joseph Cugnot in 1769. It was a steam-powered tricycle.
- The world's first Internal Combustion engine-The Pyréolophore-was probably built by Nicephore Niepce in 1807. The inventor is also credited with the invention of photography.

- Carl Benz applied for a patent for his "vehicle powered by a gas engine" on January 29, 1886. The patent application, bearing the number DRP - 37435 could also be referred as the birth certificate of the automobile. The patent application was registered with the German Imperial Patent Office in Berlin.
- There are an estimated 1.2 billion cars in the world today while there were only 500 million in 1986. According to a report released by a research house Bernstein, there will be a total of 2 billion cars on the planet by 2040.
- Almost 95% of a car's lifetime is spent parked.
- Surprisingly, 80% of an average car is recyclable. In the U.S. alone, 12 million vehicles are recycled every year. Interestingly, automotive recycling is the 16th largest industry in the U.S.
- Almost 65% of the world's population drives on the right side of the road.
- A crash typically happens within an average of three seconds after a driver is distracted. According to a source, texting while driving increases the chances of an accident by 23 times.
- Driving a car with a standard or manual transmission is not an easy job for Americans.
 Note that more than 95% of the cars in the U.S. have automatic transmission. On the other hand, in Europe and Japan, more than 80 percent of cars sold have manual transmissions.
- In 2013, white was the world's most favorite car color. According to an Australian study, white vehicles are 10% less likely to be involved in an accident. Moreover, cars that have mainstream colors are prone to theft more than those that have less popular colors
- In 2017, Tesla became the world's second most valuable car company.
- In case of a crash or an impact, airbags inflate in just 30 milliseconds.
- In 1980, Japan became the world's leading auto producer. However, currently, it is the world's third largest producer of cars (behind China and the US).
- From 1909 to 1927, Ford built more than 15 million cars. Initially, the Model T took 12 hours for assembly. With the help of the assembly line technique, this amount of time was cut to 8 minutes for each car in 1913, and finally in 1927, during the last years of the production of the Model T, the factory was delivering a completely assembled car in just 24 seconds. Now that's the power of innovation.
- One of the worlds' most loved cars; the Volkswagen Beetle has sold 20 million and more
 units worldwide and was the most popular car of the 20th century.
- The Toyota Corolla is the world's best selling car. The Corolla is sold in over 150 countries and the company sells 1 Corolla every 15 seconds. Since its launch in 1966, the company has sold more than 44.1 million of these cars and that is roughly equivalent to 20% of the company's overall sales.
- Electric cars are not a new phenomenon. Thomas Davenport is credited with building the first practical electric vehicle a small locomotive.
- According to a source, in the U.K, almost £70,000 is spent on fuel by the average motorist over their lifetime.
- The word "car" comes from the Latin word "carrus" a two-wheeled wagon.
- Almost three-quarters of the Rolls Royce cars ever produced are still on the road today.

YOUNG DRIVER AND PASSENGER DEATHS 'SWEPT UNDER THE CARPET' COMPARED TO KNIFE CRIME AND DRUGS. SAYS IAM ROADSMART

Road safety charity IAM RoadSmart has called for the issue of deaths of young people in car crashes to be given equal attention to knife crime and drugs in government plans.

The charity reiterated its call for tighter restrictions on young new drivers in response to the government's research into how the number of serious and fatal crashes can be reduced.

Friday saw IAM RoadSmart, the UK's biggest road safety charity, make its submission to a road safety inquiry by the House of Commons Transport Committee, which recently launched an investigation into ways of cutting the number of crashes involving those under 25.

In its submission, Neil Greig, IAM RoadSmart director of policy and research, said: "The risk factors are well known; lack of experience in all traffic conditions including rural roads, darkness and poor weather, distraction by peer passengers or mobile phone use and alcohol.

"Choosing restrictions to limit these risk factors should be the key objective of the government in creating a new graduated licensing system that is practical, affordable and effective in reducing young driver road deaths and injuries."

IAM RoadSmart is calling for a number of measures to be introduced which would tackle this tragic issue and ensure young drivers are less at risk when they take to the road for the first time:

- Road safety education should be part of the National Curriculum and theory and hazard perception training and testing should take place within the education system.
- IAM RoadSmart supports a 12-month minimum learning period with an online learning log for learner drivers to complete prior to taking the practical test.
- The practical driving test should include driving on high speed and rural roads.
- IAM RoadSmart strongly supports the development of a post-test phase to the licensing system. After passing the practical test, refresher and eco-driving lessons must be taken before full license status is granted.
- Alongside these interventions IAM RoadSmart supports graduated licence controls in the first months of driving to allow only one peer passenger (but no limit on older passengers) and a zero blood-alcohol limit.
- IAM RoadSmart does not support night-time curfews on young drivers as they reduce opportunities to gain experience, impact on the economy and job prospects and raise problems of enforcement.
- IAM RoadSmart is ready to provide its knowledge and expertise in developing the content of the minimum learning period and post-test interventions.

Neil added: "Successive governments have brushed this issue under the carpet which is disgraceful as road crashes are the biggest killer of young people today, yet it gets scant attention in terms of time and effort at the top level of government and in the media compared to knife crime or drugs.

It is time that the government took this seriously at last and show that it cares for the young people of the UK by supporting fundamental changes to save these valuable young lives."
